2022 Expo

Wasn't it great to be able to gather again and learn more about our favorite avian friends, the bluebirds? After a cold early spring, April 23rd ended up warm, sunny and very windy.

It was unfortunate that our first scheduled speaker, on habitat planting, had to cancel. Thurman Tucker contracted covid and had to be quarantined and was advised by his doctor not to attend our event. After learning this the Sunday before the event, we had to adjust the schedule and let the other speakers know the times had been changed.

After a welcome by our MC, Mike Sandberg, we heard from Katy Anderegg, from River Bend Nature Center, Faribault. She discussed the various stages of a Monarch Butterfly's life cycle and what she has learned about how to find eggs and feed and care for the caterpillars so they successfully pupate and emerge as adult butterflies.

Wally Swanson announced the Bluebirder of the Year, John Doherty, who monitors at Cedar Creek Ecosystem Reserve in Anoka County. He was not in attendance so will receive his plaque later.

knows what he is talking about.

After a delicious lunch there was time to visit the information booths of BBRP and various other nature non-profits or bid on the silent auction.

The afternoon program started with our Board Chairperson David Schmidt presiding over our first annual membership meeting as an independent 501(C)(3) organization. He gave a brief history of BBRP and its separation from Audubon of Minneapolis in 2018 and introduced the current board members. A summary of 2021 income, expenses, and end of year balance was displayed, discussed, and approved and he highlighted 2020-21 accomplishments & 2022 goals. He also invited anyone interested in serving on the board to apply for consideration.

The third speaker of the day was Keith Radel – "Intro to Bluebirding - Dos and Don'ts - How to get Started." At the same time there was a County Coordi-

After a cancelled Expo in 2020 and an online Expo in 2021 it was good to see all of you who came out to our event this year. Thanks to all the volunteers who made this event possible. The board is exploring possible sites in more western or northern parts of the state. We will keep you posted and we hope to see you as we gather again next year.

We conducted our first ever or first in many years, county coordinators' meeting at the Expo in April. There were twelve in attendance, which is not quite half of all coordinators, but not bad for a first meeting considering the location of the Expo.

Since the meeting two new individuals have joined the ranks of coordinators. Cynthia Sabinske, from Ghent, is an additional coordinator in Lyon County. She has been monitoring and maintaining a trail at Camden State Park and just purchased ten new boxes for upgrades on that trail.

Jon Allen, recently retired Park Supervisor for the city of Savage, has joined us as a coordinator for Scott County. He has been actively maintaining trails and mentoring volunteers in his area for trails at McColl Pond Environmental Learning Center in Savage and Canterbury Park in Shakopee.

Board Member Profile: Joni Welda

I was born and raised in Winona to a family who loved the river and outdoors. I was one of those kids who brought home every frog, turtle and stray dog that crossed my path. I became a birder at a very young age and carried a pair of binoculars around my neck wherever I went.

I became a bluebirder in the mid 1980's when the Bluebird was in its largest decline. I was doing volunteer work with the USFWS at the Trempealeau National Wildlife Refuge and met a gentleman who had a "bluebird trail" at the Refuge. I became interested in what it was all about and after learning, began to put up artificial nest boxes at my own property. I joined BRAW (Bluebird Restoration Association of Wisconsin) and NABS (North American Bluebird Society) to learn as much as I could about Bluebirds and how to help their cause. In the early 1990's I became the La Crosse County (Wisconsin) Coordinator for BRAW and gave seminars, helped schools and boy scouts to set up, build and maintain artificial nest boxes and set up trails. During those years, my sister got interested in bluebirding too and we attended 3 years of NABS annual conferences together in various states. As a County Coordinator, I met many wonderful people all with the common goal of helping the Bluebirds' numbers increase. When I moved back to Minnesota, I contacted the County Coordinator in my county about setting up a Bluebird trail for my Capstone project from the Minnesota Master Naturalist course that I was finishing up. He helped me get started and I was able to reclaim a trail that had been let go. It's given me great satisfaction to see my trail thrive after eliminating countless sparrows who had taken over the area and old boxes and watch the number of returning bluebirds increase each year—this is my 7th year with this trail.

Recently, I wanted to get more involved with the BBRP and asked to become a Board Member when an opening occurred. I look forward to getting to know more members of the BBRP and share knowledge and experiences with others. I guess for me, bluebirds have become a way of life and I can't imagine not having nest boxes to tend every year or staying involved in some way on their behalf.

I retired in 2016 after a 32-year career as a violinist but stay busy with nature photography, boating on the Mississippi and maintaining our 10 acre farm.

Report from Mike Jeresek (county coordinator for Fillmore and Houston counties) Saturday May 14

Things are heating up quite literally here. On my 35 box trail I am seeing a little of everything. I have 2 boxes that should fledge this week. 27 of the boxes have some degree of nesting going on. Here is a rundown: 3 full nests, 15 with eggs laid, 9 with bluebird chicks in them, and 8 empty boxes. I have been putting in the vanilla trees in all active boxes to help control the gnats.

Local bluebirders are reporting seeing bluebirds, so are fingers are crossed that 2022 is better than the 2021 season.

HOUSE SPARROWS - SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

(Reprinted from Bluebird News July 2007)

Editor's note: I just moved one of my nestboxes after having a house sparrow making several nests which I removed, one with two eggs in it. As an introduced bird the house sparrow and its eggs are not protected.

The next time you drive by an unattended nest box with a house sparrow sitting on top of it, here are some theoretical statistics to think about. House sparrows average 3 broods per nesting season with each brood averaging 4-7 eggs. House sparrows probably live for an average of 1-3 years in the wild. Let's make the following assumptions:

- 1. One pair of house sparrows produces 20 chicks per year
- 2. Half of the chicks do not survive
- 3. Half are male and half are female
- 4. They don't mate until year 2 (although they can reach maturity much earlier) They mate for 1 year only and then die

Using these assumptions, here's how 1 pair of house sparrows can theoretically grow in 7 years:

Year 1: 2 sparrows = 1 pair

Year 2: 10 sparrows = 5 pairs (original pair died, 20 new chicks, 10 chicks survived)

Year 3: 50 sparrows = 25 pairs (5 pairs bred, 20 chicks each, 10 chicks per pair survived)

Year 4: 250 sparrows = 125 pairs (25 pairs bred, 20 chicks each, 10 chicks per pair survived)

Year 5: 1,250 sparrows = 625 pairs (125 pairs bred, 20 chicks each, 10 chicks per pair survived)

Year 6: 6,250 sparrows = 3,125 pairs (625 pairs bred, 20 chicks each, 10 chicks per pair survived)

Year 7: 31,250 sparrows = 15,625 pairs (3125 pairs bred, 20 chicks each, 10 chicks per pair survived)

Please note that these numbers have not been scientifically proven and are provided only for purposes of demonstrating how theoretically 1 pair of house sparrows can multiply. Imagine the results if more than 50% of the chicks survive each year or each pair breeds for more than 1 season! It puts a different perspective on that unattended box with a sparrow sitting on top doesn't it?
